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SOCIAL AND LABOUR PLANS: SUMMARY OF PROJECTS IN SOUTH AFRICA



Sibanye-Stillwater: creating shared value for our communities

Social and labour plans (SLPs) are a regulatory requirement for mining companies to contribute to socioeconomic development and transformation in South Africa. They are legally binding commitments and targets set out by a mining rights holder as part of the conditions of government-approved mining rights. An SLP lodged with and approved by the Department of Mineral and Petroleum Resources (DMPR) remains binding on a mining rights holder until the issuing of the mine closure certificate or the lapse, cession or withdrawal of the mining right to which an SLP relates. Noncompliance with SLPs could result in the loss of the mining right concerned. The key elements of the SLPs (in keeping with the broad aims of the Mining Charter) are human resources development (HRD), employment equity (EE), mine community development (MCD), procurement, enterprise and supplier development (ESD), housing and living conditions, and management of downscaling and retrenchments.

In this report we provide feedback on progress made on 20 SLPs. The report focuses only on mine community development achieved through infrastructure, skills and economic development projects. Through inherited and newly developed SLPs, the SA region has taken responsibility for 153 projects in total since 2013, of which 112 have been completed, 26 are in progress and 15 have not yet started. In addition, there are 34 projects awaiting DMPR approval.

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CURRENT SLP STATUS

The following SLPs are at varying stages of implementation. The projects include current SLPs, backlog projects inherited from acquired companies, and those awaiting DMPR approval.

SLPs for the SA gold operations:

1. Driefontein SLP (2017-2021)

The Driefontein 2017–2021 SLP was approved in April 2019 and includes five projects: Blybank multipurpose hall, farmer out-grower scheme, a nursery, and a manufacturing incubator, which commenced post-COVID-19 lockdown. The other two projects have been handed over to the beneficiaries, i.e., four shearing sheds constructed in the Chris Hani District Municipality, two in the Emalahleni Local Municipality in the Eastern Cape, and a waste recycling project in Great Kei Local Municipality.

2. Driefontein SLP (2022-2026)

This SLP was submitted to the DMPR in April 2022 for approval. The approval is pending finalisation of the Section 29 engagements, amendment to LED projects, and the final resubmission of the SLP.

3. Beatrix SLP (2022–2026)

The SLP was approved in 2024, and implementation is in progress.

4. Kloof SLP (2017–2021)

The Kloof SLP, 2017–2021 was approved in November 2019. Out of seven projects, four have been completed and three remain in progress. The four projects that have been completed are:

- the refurbishment of Badirile community multi-purpose centre
- the resourcing of the Toekomsrus youth centre
- two projects in the labour sending area

The three backlog projects that are in implementation are the manufacturing incubator, waste management, and the farmer out-grower scheme.

Kloof 2012-2016

There are two backlog projects from 2012-2016 SLPs: the construction of the Westcol TVET College and the refurbishment of two science laboratories at Kgothalang Secondary School. The initial commitment, as per the SLP, was to construct a science laboratory at Simunye Secondary School. As there was a delay with the construction of this school, by the partners, a mobile science laboratory was delivered as a temporary measure. We applied through section 102 process to reallocate the commitment to Kgothalang Secondary School as the beneficiary, by refurbishing their two science laboratories.

A technical and vocational education and training (TVET) college project in partnership with Goldfields and the South Deep Trust has faced implementation challenges and is set to be completed in 2026.

Our SLP projects are based from the socioeconomic needs of communities and are aligned to the Integrated Development Plans (IDPs) of local municipalities. IDPs are legal instruments for municipal planning, which intersect with national and provincial spheres of government. Infrastructure projects are undertaken in collaboration with relevant government departments, which are responsible for operational and maintenance support once projects are handed over.

Our projects include local economic development (LED) programmes – including infrastructure investment and income generating-projects – and human resource development (HRD) programmes for community members, in accordance with Section 18.2 of the Skills Development Act (1997). The primary aims of LED projects are to:

- Implement sustainable socioeconomic programmes in host communities and areas where the industry historically sourced labour
- Promote enterprise development
- · Implement skills-development programmes to promote employability and alleviate poverty
- Assist with the development of social infrastructure (such as schools and clinics/healthcare)
- Improve community environmental management and food security

Shared value

We implement projects in collaboration with government and communities to ensure that they remain sustainable beyond the SLP cycle and the life of the mine. However, we continue to experience challenges with the maintenance of infrastructure and the survival of economic enterprises, which are not immune to the economic climate in which they operate. To support their success, we work with the University of Pretoria's Centre for Entrepreneurship to support these enterprises in best-practice for entrepreneurial endeavour. Our model is based on shared value, which also requires shared accountability. The aim is to enable these enterprises to sustain themselves, to generate developmental outcomes and remain sustainable beyond incubation.

Handover

At the end of the five-year SLP cycle or at completion, projects are handed over to the relevant government departments in terms of infrastructure (i.e. Education, Health), and to project participants and LED departments at local municipalities. In terms of income-generating projects, the handover plan considers that the project received adequate funding, that the entrepreneurs (participants) received appropriate training, and that they were connected to the relevant markets.

Crime and vandalism continue to erode the value shared through infrastructure and economic projects.















5. Kloof SLP (2022-2026)

The SLP was submitted to the DMPR for approval in April 2022. Engagement continues with the DMPR to finalise its approval.

6. Cooke 1, 2 and 3 and Ezulwini SLPs (2022-2026)

A closure process of underground operations for the Cooke 1, 2 and 3, and Ezulwini shafts was initiated in 2017. However, we submitted new SLPs for both operations in October 2023 as part of the social closure programme and to give effect to one of our sustainability sub-themes: promoting long-term economic sustainability and post-mining economies.

7. Burnstone SLP (2017–2021)

This SLP has not yet been approved by the DMPR. However, in consultation with Dipaleseng Local Municipality (DLM) and Mpumalanga's Department of Agriculture Rural Development and Environmental Affairs, a farmer production unit project was adopted in October 2022 which is now operational.

8. Burnstone SLP (2022-2026)

The SLP was submitted in April 2022 with thematic areas for the Mine Community Development-LED section. Consultations with the municipality are still ongoing to identify and endorse the project.

9. Southern Free State Wits Gold (2017–2021)

As development of the mine has not commenced, a section 102 application with the DMPR to amend the LED projects with the current status is underway.

SLPs for the SA PGM operations:

10. Kroondal SLP (2012-2016)

This SLP was inherited from Aquarius in 2016. Out of five projects, three have been completed, one is in progress, and one is on hold due to a pending relocation of the Lapologang community by a neighbouring mine.

11. Rustenburg SLP (2016–2020)

23 projects have been completed, and one project, a construction of a walkway bridge, was terminated in consultation with the service provider and informed the municipality and DMPR of the termination. The termination was as a result of persistent project disruption by criminal elements and extortion by third party to prevent the local service provider to continue with the project.

12. Rustenburg and PSA SLP (2021–2025)

The SLPs were approved in November 2023, and implementation has commenced in line with the implementation plan submitted to the Regulator.

13. Marikana EPL/WPL SLP (2019–2023)

This SLP was only approved in April 2022, and project implementation then commenced. Out of 13 projects, four are complete, nine are in progress, and one has not yet started.

14. Marikana EPL/WPL SLP (2024–2028)

The SLPs for the period 2024–2028 were submitted to the DMPR for approval and engagements continue for finalisation.

15. Marikana Pandora SLP (2023–2027)

The SLPs for the period 2023–2027 were submitted to the DMPR for approval and engagements continue for finalisation.

16. Marikana Messina SLP (2016–2020)

Out of seven projects, six are completed, and one is in progress.

17. Marikana Messina SLP (2021–2025)

The SLPs were submitted to the DMPR for approval in April 2022. We have engaged with the DMPR several times through the section 29 directive to provide further information and clarity regarding the projects in the SLP. Approval has yet to be granted.

18. Blue Ridge SLP (2019–2023)

The SLP was submitted to the DMPR for approval in April 2022 and approval has not yet been received.

19. Kroondal MR 104/113 Consolidated SLP (2024–2028)

The SLP was approved in September 2024, and the implementation of the LED projects has commenced.

20. Kroondal MRS 368/369/370/113 (2017-2021)

The SLPs have been submitted to the DMPR and are awaiting approval.














